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From the Director

Do libraries have a future? Questions about the future of libraries has become a recurring theme. The questions are phrased in several different ways-"Why do we need to build a new library when books are in a state of decline," "Will there be any books twenty years from now," or "Why do we need a library when everything is on the internet?" To some, in this era of ready internet access, wireless connectivity, and ever-proliferating electronic resources, the idea of spending several million dollars on a "brick and mortar" library does not seem to be a wise use of scarce tax dollars. How-

ever, the trustees and staff of the Boyden Libraryalong with the thousands of library patrons using the library each yearrespectfully disagree. Library circulation reached an all-time high in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2009—circulation went over the 200,000 mark for the first time, topping out at 206,201. Nearly 133,000 people visited the library and more than 3,800 attended Children's Room programs. Public internet computers were accessed over 10,000 times by library patrons, and library meeting rooms were used more than 500 times by community groups and or-

ganization, as well as town boards and committees. Boyden Library patrons had access not only to the 100,000—plus item collection at Boyden, but also to the 3.5 million item collection of the SAILS library network—and those patrons made good use of the SAILS collection, requesting nearly 28,000 items from other libraries. Boyden's collection was in demand as well—Boyden loaned nearly 30.000 items to other network members. Please note that we are talking about "items,"—not simply "books."



The Boyden Library is happy to now offer a Playaways for kids. A Playaway is a new type of audio book with the digital content pre-loaded on one small listening device. Users need only to supply their own earbuds or headphones and AAA battery before enjoying a complete story. Playaways check out of the library for two weeks at a time. The Children's Playaway kits are made up of the Playaway on a lanyard, the book, and a teacher's guide. The first collection of Playaways include titles that appear on the Foxborough Public School's summer reading list:

- The Face on the Milk Carton by Caroline B. Cooney





While the bulk of the Boyden Library collection is still comprised of books, there are dozens of other kinds of materials to borrow—with a number of them being borrowed electronically, and not at the library circulation desk. Boyden Library collections include books, magazines, books-on-tape and books-on-CD, DVDs, videocassettes,, music CDs, college courses on CD. Cassette, or DVD, language-instruction material, study-guides for various tests, picture books, books for beginning readers, puppets, puzzles and more.

So, even if books are on a decline, it's quite clear that there's a great deal more to today's libraries than simply books. Libraries have been in the forefront of adapting technology changes for years—and will continue to in the future. Automated circulation systems and online catalogs have been a staple of public library life for nearly 30 years. It's difficult to find free public internet access anywhere other than a public library; you can sample Boyden's wireless internet connectivity without having to by a cup of coffee.



While we've been wringing our hands over the demise of books, we've seen several other media formats come and go—8-track tapes, cassettes, LP records, videocassettes, and several early versions of electronic book readers. Throughout all that, books have remained a popular choice for thousands of readers. The book—portable, inexpensive, software free, and battery less—remains an efficient and effective vehicle for information transfer. While books are gradually yielding their leading role in media, there are few, if any, libraries willing to follow the lead of that Central Massachusetts private school, which has abandoned books in favor of electronic technology—and, yes, a \$12,00 espresso machine. We at the Boyden Library think that the library—and the services it provides—is here to stay for quite some time, But don't ask us—ask those 130,000 people who came in to borrow over 200,000 items last year.


